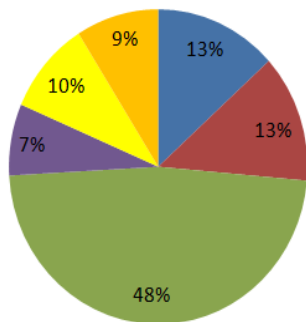
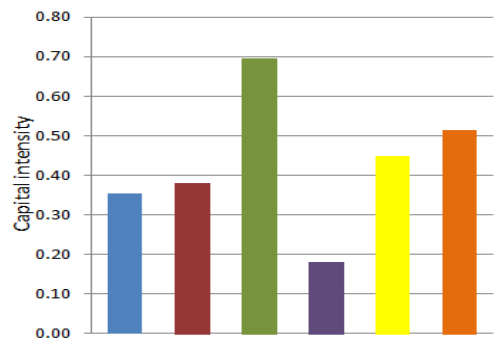


Proportion of GDP productivity across the Vocational Pathways measured by GDP from labour (per person) for 2015

Valued skills can include:

- analysing a health issue for an adolescent or other social group
- analysing issues related to the provision of food for people with specific food needs or dietary requirements
- making sense of trend data
- demonstrating social responsibility in a community context
- applying a social responsibility model in physical activities
- using software to produce a range of documents for a business or organisation
- understanding and explaining legal concepts
- investigating biological material at a microscopic level
- demonstrating an understanding of seismic and ocean waves and how to manage or mitigate risks they may produce
- responding responsibly to vulnerability across a range of social groups
- being empathetic, sensitive and able to listen to others
- Being able to strategise and apply clear thinking under pressure
- Being comfortable with detail and procedure

Vocational Pathways provide a framework for learner engagement, skill development, work experience and progression.

Youth Guarantee initiatives provide a set of tools and resources to address learner needs in the most appropriate ways.

The Social & Community Services sector is a big employer in New Zealand and is essential for maintaining the well-being and safety of New Zealanders. There are growing demands for more educated and skilled young people to enter the industries.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Careers adviser, community worker, counsellor, psychologist (clinical, criminal justice, educational), funeral director/embalmer, home aide, life coach, early childhood educator, social worker, teacher, support worker, therapist (art, music, occupational therapy, psychotherapy).

DEFENCE

Combat/warfare specialist, communications operator, driver, engineering officer, fire-fighter, gunner/ rifleman, medic, mapmaker, pilot, steward, technician/specialist (aircraft, avionics, electronics, hydrographic, ICT, machinery and transport repair specialist, logistics, supply and others).

EMERGENCY SERVICES AND PROTECTION

Ambulance officer/paramedic, animal control officer, border protection/bio-security officer, corrections officer, criminologist, customs officer, conservation worker/manager, emergency management officer, environmental health officer, fire-fighter, fisheries officer, health and safety inspector, immigration officer, loss prevention officer, parking warden, personal protection officer, police officer/detective, private investigator, probation officer.

HEALTH AND HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Nurse (community, district, hospital, mental health, plunket, practice, public health), nurse aide, midwife, health and safety officer, health care assistant, health promoter/educator, caregiver, rest home manager.

What industries are there?

This is a large and growing sector with jobs and services that are essential for community well-being and safety.

It's a high-employment, high-growth sector and demand for workers in these industries is expected to continue in future years. New Zealand's ageing population will need to be housed, managed, and cared for.

There's a constant demand for more police, corrections, and security officers. The need for immigration, customs, and quarantine officers is also increasing as more people and goods move in and out of the country and bio-security threats increase.
